

THE ALIEN MINOR ADJUSTMENT ACT OF 2010

What is the Alien Minor Adjustment Act of 2010?

This proposed law would provide immigration relief to a select group of aliens and allow them to become permanent residents if the following elements apply:

1. They came to the United States as children under the age of eighteen (18); and
2. They are long-term United States residents (five years or more); and
3. They are of good moral character; and
4. They have no age restrictions for applying for relief under this bill; and
5. They must not be inadmissible or deportable except for specifically enumerated exceptions; and
6. They have graduated from high school or earned a G.E.D.; and
7. They have filed and paid all taxes due for any periods of employment while living in the United States.

Additionally, this bill allows, and encourages, persons in this category to lawfully enlist in the various branches of the United States military, and, if they serve honorably for a period of thirty (30) months or more, to become United States citizens on an expedited path.

Furthermore, this bill provides a limitation on the use against the person of specifically enumerated victimless offenses, and a means of expungement for same.

This bill was drafted by Wayne Buchanan Eads, Attorney at Law, but has not yet been introduced in Congress. The bill must be enacted by Congress before it becomes law.

It is estimated that the Alien Minor Adjustment Act of 2010 could affect as many as 1,830,000 aliens presently living in the United States.
